As we waited for the numbers to come in for the Class of 2021, we held our collective breaths. After all, this was the class whose internships had been cancelled in the summer of 2020. They were the ones who spent a large portion of their junior year in lockdown and navigated a dual-modality college experience for much of the 20-21 academic year.

When we shared the news with our team, a cheer went up as we celebrated that **98.9%** of this class had landed, a number very close to our pre-COVID numbers after a dip to 96.7% for the Class of 2020. Our Center for Vocation and Career team had done all we could to make up for those lost internships, for the decrease of in-person connections with our alumni and employers, and for the disruptions in the ways we typically join in the journey with students through their vocational process. It was gratifying to see how God had blessed these efforts.

And these students leaned into their new reality. They built on their flexibility, their creativity, and their resilience in the face of challenge. They found jobs. They were accepted into graduate programs. They went off on adventures to continue engaging in opportunities for growth.



Survey Methodology


This survey is conducted according to guidelines from the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE), the professional association for college career services. NACE's First Destination Survey captures information on how new college graduates fare in their careers within six months of graduation. The annual initiative provides clear, concise, and consistent data on the outcomes associated with a college education on a national scale (naceweb.org). In addition to providing outcomes for specific graduating classes, the First Destination Survey is designed to provide data trends over time to inform the discussion about the value of higher education. The standards and protocols allow collection of information from an electronic survey conducted by the Center for Vocation and Career, as well as job information from sources like LinkedIn.



As a transfer student, Maggie made Wheaton her new home by getting involved in Residence Life staff and working at Sam's. These experiences pushed Maggie towards a career in consulting which would allow her to work directly with people in an environment shaped by challenge and learning. In the spring of her senior year, Maggie joined the CVC's Consulting, Tech, and Finance Career Community, where she was able to network with Wheaton alumni in the consulting industry and eventually land a job with Slalom as an Associate Consultant. With limited experience in the consulting world, she was initially unsure about how she could utilize the skills and knowledge from Wheaton at Slalom. However, Maggie said Wheaton prepared her well to succeed in her new role: "I know how to do research, how to ask good questions, and how to figure things out for myself and I think that Wheaton taught me how to do those things very well." Maggie's advice to students is to "Be fearless and go after what you really want to do. Truly anything can happen, and my situation is a prime example of that."



After interning at World Relief as a case manager, Luke took a leap of faith to join the Apprenticeship program with Samaritan's Purse. Following 6 months of intensive training, he is now serving in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, helping both the government and Samaritan's Purse handle supply chain logistics, the backbone of international aid work. He said, "Wheaton prepared me to consider other perspectives, listen well, and be slow to speak. My mentors have helped me learn to ask good questions and learn from people who've had different experiences than myself." These soft skills have prepared Luke to excel in an international context. Luke's advice to current students is to work as hard as you can in every role, even if it isn't what you see yourself doing in the future. This way, your character and capabilities will be put on display, opening doors to allow God to direct you where he will.
