Facts

- The Psy.D. program in Clinical Psychology was established in 1993 and has been continuously accredited by the American Psychological Association since 1998. This five-year program admits some 18–20 students annually.
- The M.A. program in Clinical Psychology, a two-year program, was established in 1977 and admits approximately 30 students each year.
- In 1999, an additional Master's degree was added in Counseling Ministries, a one-year degree for individuals who primarily work through churches or mission agencies.

Psy.D. Program Re-Accredited by the American Psychological Association

Program receives 7 year accreditation term

In 2007, the Wheaton College Doctor of Psychology Program began the process of self-study for re-accreditation by the American Psychological Association. The self-study involved the participation of all Psy.D. alumni, current Psy.D. students, all faculty and staff of the Wheaton College Psychology Department, and administration and staff from other departments of Wheaton College. The Self-Study culminated in an 858 page document which was submitted to the APA in September 2007. Helen De Vries, Program Director, says, "We are delighted to have received reaccreditation from the APA. Re-accreditation for seven years by the APA is affirming to me of the quality of the Wheaton College Psy.D. program. We could not have achieved such a standing without the help of everyone associated with the program."

A team of three representatives from other universities was selected in collaboration with the APA during Fall 2007. The site visit team independently reviewed the self-study document and visited Wheaton College and the Psy.D. program on April 17-18, 2008. Robert Gregory, Department Chair, recalls, "This remarkable collaborative community effort of alumni, current students, faculty, staff, and Wheaton College administration helped make the self-study and site visit a success."

In mid-August, the Psychology Department received the good news. The Psy.D. Program received a seven year re-accreditation term. Currently, seven years is the longest period of time that the APA grants for accreditation for Doctoral Programs in Professional Psychology. The department is grateful for the re-accreditation term and believes it is a reflection of the quality of the program.

Psychology Department goes to HoneyRock Camp

3rd Straight Year of June Course Offerings in Northwoods of Wisconsin

Try to imagine what it might be like to have a graduate psychology class in June in the beautiful Northwoods of Wisconsin. Since 2005, that has been an option for students in both our M.A. and Psy.D. programs. Courses like bereavement, cross-cultural psychology, equine-assisted therapy, play therapy, and spiritual formation have been offered in a weeklong format at the Northwoods Campus of Wheaton College. The setting has been ideal for recreation, relaxation, and collaborative learning. HoneyRock has been an important part of Wheaton College since 1951. It includes several hundred



acres on the largest chain of inland lakes in the world. In addition to the formal classroom context, grad students have the chance to interact with their peers and professors in a wide variety of outdoor-oriented activities. Shared meals and campfires provide opportunities to fellowship in ways that can be exceedingly rare in the Billy Graham Center on campus.

Faculty members Richard Butman, Michael Mangis, Derek McNeil, and Bob and Terri Watson all learned to appreciate the unique learning environment of HoneyRock while working together on scholarly activities. Indeed, their conversations "Up North" were instrumental in the development of their HoneyRock model of integration (i.e., servant-practitioner-scholar). That collaboration led to the decision to offer 1-hour courses in a summer format that were difficult to fit into the more traditional academic year. In addition to full-time psychology graduate students, former students, and practicing clinicians have joined the community.

The Psychology Department is also actively involved in Wheaton's program for incoming freshmen and transfer students. "Wheaton Passage" takes place at HoneyRock in August prior to New Student Orientation. Faculty serve as coleaders of either "wilderness track" or "camp track" formats that last from eight days to more than two weeks.

If you might be interested in participating in Grad Psych Week in 2009, speak to any of the faculty involved. Our dates for next summer are June 13th–20th. We can guarantee that the sights, sounds, and smells will be strikingly different than those of our Southwoods Campus!

ALUMNA PROFILE: M.A. Graduate Combines Master's in Public Policy to Serve Vulnerable Populations in Illinois

Caronina Grimble, M.A., began working as a Casework Manager and Associate Therapist at Wheaton Youth Outreach (WYO) after graduation. There she provided support services for homeless youth, and supportive casework services for young single women and young single mothers who were homeless or at risk of being homeless.

Of her work at WYO, Caronina says "In serving the women in our programs, and those that would come to us for other types of assistance, I got a first-hand look at the social service system, and how difficult it was to navigate. I knew if I was

having a hard time getting answers and identifying resources, the people I was serving were having a hard time, too. I remember thinking 'There's got to be a better way', and I set out to find it. So I applied to policy school."

Caronina earned a Master of Public Policy degree from the Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago. Caronina presently works as a Senior Project Manager in the office of the Assistant Secretary at Illinois Department of Human Services. She serves as a policy-making official, interacting regularly with the Governor's office and with other state agencies to revise, develop, and implement programs and policies that address the needs of the most vulnerable populations in the state. Some of the projects Caronina works on include: poverty reduction strategies; language access issues; and anti-human trafficking efforts.

Caronina says, "I think I have the greatest job in the world. I get to work on finding and figuring out how to implement solutions that change people's lives; does it get any better than that?"
